
Caravan to the North by Jorge Argueta | YA ARG






Allison runs away and, in what she thinks is an abandoned house, finds a home with Marla, an elderly woman with dementia who believes her to be an old friend named Toffee.








Home is Not a Country by Safia Elhillo | YA ELH


A novel in verse about the life and work of Rubén Darío, a Nicaraguan poet who started life as an abandoned child and grew to become the father of a new literary movement.

In India, a girl who excels at Bharatanatyam dance refuses to give up after losing a leg in an accident.

Kent State by Deborah Wiles | YA WIL

Told from different points of view--protesters, students, National Guardsmen, and "townies"--recounts the story of what happened at Kent State in May 1970, when four college students were killed by National Guardsmen, and a student protest was turned into a bloody battlefield.



Punching the Air by Ibi Zoboi and Yusef Salaam | YA ZOB

Suddenly, at just sixteen years old, Amal's bright future is upended: he is convicted of a crime he didn't commit and sent to prison. Despair and rage almost sink him until he turns to the refuge of his words, his art.
